### Internship Program Admissions

Each intern will participate in 3 rotations: Child/Adolescence, Substance Abuse, and Crisis Services. In addition to rotational experiences, interns will maintain a caseload of approximately 10 outpatient clients throughout the year. Other activities include forensic assessments for individuals with legal infractions to determine treatment recommendations that will be used in court proceedings, as well as completion of a community service project and presentation of a didactic seminar. The intern will function as a member of the interdisciplinary team, serving in multiple capacities depending on cases. Child/Adolescence: Intern functions may include, but are not limited to: Integrated Clinical Assessments, psychological testing (if recommended), truancy-based counseling, behavioral consultation, or functional behavioral assessments. One of the main clinical components for the intern on this rotation will include addressing psychosocial factors leading to truancy. Substance Abuse: Interns will spend their time in the Newark, Delaware office of Open Door, Inc., an affiliate of Holcomb Behavioral Health Systems. The focus of this rotation is to give interns the exposure to the provision of formal substance abuse treatment. Clients being seen out of this office may be attending outpatient therapy on an elective basis or may be court mandated, in particular as a result of a DUI conviction. Interns will provide individual and group therapy as clinically indicated. Substance Abuse assessments are another clinical service that will be offered by interns. Crisis Services: Interns on this rotation will engage in telephonic crisis counseling to those in acute crisis; conduct integrated clinical assessment for walk-in clients; and provide mobile crisis interventions to clients including crisis de-escalation, solution-focused interventions, and supportive counseling. Additional focus includes providing consultation and education to concerned family members, school personnel, and other identified agents calling on a client's behalf.
